

• Still No Woman at the Helm of the UN

(Open Democracy; 9 min. read) - António Guterres's election as the new UN Secretary-General is a stark illustration of how male-dominated decision-making means that female leadership is not just rare, but virtually inconceivable. Though there is still no woman at the helm of the UN, we hope Guterres will adopt a progressive feminist agenda!

Nations Can Now Deliver the Paris Agreement by Supporting Cities (Huffington Post; 9 min. read) - The Paris Agreement crossed the last threshold after a total of 74 countries accounting for 58.82 percent of global emissions fast-tracked ratification. Cities need to put forward local commitments and many metropolises have already delivered ambitious climate action.


