The Facts

on Women In the Workplace

- ✗ On average, women earn 78 cents per each dollar men earn
- ✗ Women of color only earn an average of 60 cents per dollar
- ✗ Gendered divisions of labor are still prevalent in the U.S.
- ✗ The majority of women are employed in administrative support and childcare positions, while the majority of men work in the mechanics and construction industry; the male-dominated industries tend to pay more than women-dominated fields
- ✗ When women occupy higher-paid positions they still earn less than men—women managers only occupy 1 percent of the highest paid managerial positions

Green Jobs can Tackle The Economic Gender Gap

- ✓ A green economy means a green job sector, presenting a new opportunity to address gender inequities in the workplace by including women as equal beneficiaries of 'green' job training and employment
- ✓ The green job movement specifically aims to address economic justice, taking the -isms out of the workplace; this includes tackling racism, classism, elitism, and sexism among others
- ✓ The green job movement targets low-income and impoverished communities, of which women represent a large number
- ✓ In the demand for economic justice the green jobs movement builds a new platform for gender justice in the workplace

As the Obama Administration and the new U.S. Congress plan to create millions of new green jobs, let's ensure women are at the decision-making table. Let's also make sure that green jobs policy and financing explicitly include women as equal recipients of training and employment opportunities. Essential to economic justice is gender justice, and in our fight for a new green economy, women and men must be equal partners!
